Mark's Musing

Recently a Christian friend of mine asked me why we celebrate Lent. He knows all about Holy week, and he knows that Lent is a time to reflect on our sins (the things we do that make us turn away from God) and our relationship with God. So he was wondering more about the theology behind Lent, and from what things in the Bible or Jesus life that the celebration of Lent comes from. So I thought as we begin Lent, I would share with you some information I dug up and shared with my friend! You long-time Christians may know much of this, but even if you do, a review of our traditions, and our spiritual practices is never a bad thing!

Lent is the forty days before Easter. Lent excludes Sundays because every Sunday is like a little Easter. Basically, it's about one-tenth of a year (like a tithe of time).

The beginning of Lent is Ash Wednesday. Most churches begin Lent with an Ash Wednesday worship service where we recognize our mortality, repent of our sins, and re-turn to our loving God. We commit to changing our lives over the next forty days so that we might be more like Christ. In most Ash Wednesday services, a minister or priest marks the sign of the cross on a person's forehead with ashes

Why ashes? In Jewish and Christian history, ashes are a sign of mortality and repentance. Mortality, because when we die, our bodies eventually decompose and we become dust/dirt/ash/ whatever. Repentance, because long ago, when people felt remorse for something they did, they would put ashes on their head and wear "sackcloth" (scratchy clothing) to remind them that sin is pretty uncomfortable and leads to a sort of death of the spirit. This was their way of confessing their sins and asking for forgiveness.

During an Ash Wednesday service, folks are invited to come forward to receive the ashes. The minister will make a small cross on your forehead by smudging the ashes. While the ashes remind us of our mortality and sin, the cross reminds us of Jesus' resurrection (life after death) and forgiveness. It's a powerful, non-verbal way that we can experience God's forgiveness and renewal as we return to Jesus.

So what is LENT? It all began as a way to imitate Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness. At Jesus' baptism the Bible tells us the heaven's opened, the Spirit of God, which looked like a dove, descended and landed on Jesus, and a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, My Beloved, with whom I am pleased." Afterward, as told in Matthew 4:1-11, Jesus was sent into the wilderness by the Spirit. There he fasted and prayed for 40 days. During that time, he was tempted, and was given the strength to resist the temptation. Afterwards, he was ready to begin his ministry and fulfill the mission God gave him.

Some speculate that Jesus needed time with God to sort through all that God was calling him to do. Maybe he needed to get away from family, friends and the familiar routine in order to see God (and himself) more clearly. Perhaps he wanted some intentional time with God as he searched for direction and answers, just like we sometimes need to take some serious time to pray and listen for God's direction.

Lent is about repenting, that is, turning away from those things that keep God from being a priority – our sins – and returning to God and re-focusing our lives to be more in line with Christ's ways of living and being. You might think of it as a 40 day trial run in changing your lifestyle and letting God change your heart. As part of this trial run, many people engage in one or more of these spiritual practices for Lent:

FASTING/ABSTINENCE: Fasting is often associated with not eating any food. But that's not the only way to fast. You can fast by cutting out some of the things in your life that distract you from God. Some Christians use the whole 40 days to fast from candy, TV, soft drinks, cigarettes, alcohol or meat, or other things they enjoy as a way to purify their bodies and lives. You might skip one meal a day and use that time to pray instead. Or you can give up some activity like reality TV to spend time outside enjoying God's creation. What do you need to let go of or "fast" from in order to focus

on God? What clutters your calendar and life? How can you simplify your life in terms of what you eat, wear or do?

SERVICE: Instead of giving up something, some Christians take on something for Christ. You can collect food for the needy, volunteer once a week to tutor children, or work for reform and justice in your community, or work for PADS. You can commit to help a different stranger, co-worker or friend every day of Lent. Serving others is one way we serve God. And giving of yourself is a form of prayer.

PRAYER: Lent can also be used as a time of intentional prayer. You can pray while you walk, create music or art as a prayer to God, or savor a time of quiet listening. All can be ways of becoming more in tune with God.

Christians from many different traditions celebrate Lent. How will you use the time during this Lenten season to grow closer to God?

Suggestions of things you can do to help yourself grow closer to God:

- 10. Try an electronic fast. Give up TV, Facebook, texting, tweeting, e-mail and all things electronic for one day every week. (Or everyday of Lent!) Use the time to read and pray.
- 9. Start a prayer rhythm. Each day of Lent, go to our prayer list and pray for another person.
- 8. Go deeper into the Bible. Come to Tuesday or Wednesday Bible Study.
- 7. Forgive someone who doesn't deserve it (maybe even yourself.) Study a book on forgiveness.
- 6. Give up soft drinks, fast food, tea or coffee. Give the money you save to help folks in a different part of the world who are in crisis.
- 5. Create a daily quiet time. Spend 10 minutes a day in silence and prayer. Read a daily devotional for the season of Lent. See how it can help you add spiritual practice to your daily life beyond Lent.
- 4. Cultivate a life of gratitude. Write someone a thank you letter each week and be aware of how many people have helped you along the way. Learn more about the spiritual practice of gratitude.
- 3. Participate in a Lent Photo-a-Day practice and pray each day with your camera in your hand.
- 2. Volunteer one hour or more each week with a local shelter, tutoring program, nursing home, prison ministry. Learn about global issues and how you can help.
- 1. Pray for others you see as you walk to and from classes or drive to and from work.

May God Bless your Lenten practices and may you grow ever closer to God in the next 40 days!




WEDNESDAY EVENING LENTEN PROGRAM BEGINS ON MARCH 8, 2017, AT 5:30 PM.

THE SURPRISING LIFE OF SAINT PETER

The Wednesday Lenten Program for this year will begin on March 8th, and will take place every Wednesday, from 5:30 to 7:00 pm through April 5th. Come for a simple meal of soup and bread, and then learn some new things about the 1st Century and the life of Simon-Peter. Marilyn Huntman Giese will walk us through her book, *The Eye of God: A Fisherman's Tale.*

Come and Broaden your enjoyment of the greatest story ever told with insights gained from study, travel and prayer related to the life of Simon Peter. Join Marilyn Huntman Giese as she guides us through St. Peter's witness to his faith in the resurrected Jesus that extends throughout the Roman Empire. Her knowledge of the Bible opens paths hinted at but not often explored. When the Emperor Nero rounds up 'Christians' and kills them as enemies of Rome, Peter's last word words to Jesus' followers bring hope to those who believe.

Marilyn Huntman Giese was born in Washington, D.C. to parents blending Roman Catholic and German Evangelical backgrounds. She grew up in Palatine and Chicago. She and her sisters hosted a teen talk show on an early FM radio station located in the Tribune Tower, and, as a trio, sang in a Chicagoland talent show on the stage of the Oriental Theater. After attending Iowa State College in Ames, Iowa she married and raised five children in Wheaton, IL with her husband Stanley C. Giese, D.D.S. In 1970 and 1984 she fulfilled her dream to travel to archaeological sites throughout the Near and Middle East.

Experiences in Israel and Turkey led her to write her book, *The Eye of God: A Fisherman's Tale.* The fictionalized story is told in the voice of Saint Peter, trusted disciple of Jesus of Nazareth. The author's photo-journal *When the World Changed, A Revolutionary Peace*, contains photos from both trips with text following the life of Jesus as he traveled through Israel.

Marilyn served on the boards of the Naperville Writers Group and the Illinois State Poetry Society. Her poems are in several anthologies.
