I was straightening up some things in my office this week and in one corner of my office (behind the cabinet for my robes) I found a large garbage bag with a "pillar of cloud" and a "pillar of fire". These were two props I had rigged up for a sermon I did several years ago entitled, "Moses and the Whiners". I got to thinking about that sermon and about Moses' response to the whining and complaining of his people. If you don't remember the sermon, I'll give you a quick summary.

The people of Israel are living as slaves in Egypt. They are abused and oppressed. They cry out to God, who hears their cry and calls Moses to go to Egypt and free the Israelites. With some help from God and few plagues, Moses gets them freed and leads the people out of Egypt. And God travels with them, in a Pillar of Cloud by day, and a Pillar of Fire by night.

But the Egyptians wake up to the fact that their cheap labor force is gone, and they pursue the Israelites. As the Israelites stand on the shores of the Reed (or Red if you prefer) Sea, Pharaoh and his army closes in. The Israelites, with the Pillar of Cloud before them, whine to Moses, "Moses, was it because there were not enough graves in Egypt that you brought us out here to die? Better we should have stayed as slaves in Egypt than to come out here to die."

So, Moses turns to God, and with God's help, Moses delivers the people from the hands of Pharaoh. The Bible tells us that the "the people feared the Lord, and believed in the Lord and his servant Moses" (Ex. 14: 29-31).

Well, the people of Israel were traveling through the wilderness - which was mostly desert - and there were a lot of them, so they needed lots of food and water. They came to a place called Marah, where there was water, but they couldn't drink it because it was bad, or as the Bible says, "bitter". So the people complained, whining to Moses, "Moses, you brought us out here into the desert, and the water here stinks. What are we supposed to drink? We need water, Moses!" And again, Moses turns to God, and the Bible tells us that God showed Moses a piece of wood that he threw into the water, and it made the water drinkable. And the people were happy.

Well, as the Israelites traveled on, they began to run out of food. And the people were hungry. Again, they all complained to Moses. AGAIN! They whined, "Moses, we're hungry! We need to get some food right now, Moses. If only God would have just killed us in Egypt, when we sat around and had our fill of bread and meat. But Nooooo, you had to bring us out here in the wilderness so that our whole nation could starve to death." And once again, Moses turns to God asking for help, and God sent manna, or bread from heaven. It appeared each morning on the ground, and the people had food to eat.

The Israelites were still in the wilderness, and they were thirsty again. And their thirst was a desperate thirst. And the whining and complaining started again. And Moses was the target for their complaining because he was their leader. Again, Moses turned to God, and leaned on God for help and guidance.

As I think about the Exodus story, I'm struck by the way Moses leaned so faithfully on God throughout the journey and throughout his responsibility of leadership. Nobody else seems to know what to do. The people complain over and over again and direct all their whining at Moses. And every time, Moses turns to God in prayer, asking for help, guidance, and wisdom. Why? Because Moses trusted God to be there, to give him what he needed for the circumstances he faced.

It's a good reminder, isn't it? To keep turning, and turning again, to God for direction in our complicated lives. How often do you turn to God when life becomes hard? When other people, your family, your co-workers, your fellow church members are complaining and whining about the circumstances? How often do you ask those who are doing the complaining to stop and pray with you, so together you can ask God for what you all might need?

Be the "someone"

Once you attend a few Shepherds Leadership Team (SLT) meetings you start to appreciate how many people it takes to make our church what it is.

Someone to prepare the service- the prayers, the sermon, the music.

Someone to practice the anthems.

Someone to buy the grape juice and fill the cups for Communion.

Someone to buy or bake the bread and cut it up.

Someone to prepare the slides for the screens each Sunday.

Someone to make sure the computer is set up and run the program.

Someone to prepare the materials for the stewardship pledge drive each fall.

Someone to order the envelopes for our contributions and someone to keep track of contributions for tax purposes.

Someone to organize the bi-annual rummage sales – sorting, pricing & selling.

Someone to hang the banners and decorate the altar in keeping with the liturgical season.

Someone to find the Sunday School curriculum, recruit teachers, sets up projects and teach the children. And someone to do the same for Vacation Bible School.

Someone to ensure the lawn gests mowed and the parking lot plowed.

What did I have to put out in my front yard? I came up with a few chocolate chips and M&M's. And so, I made cookies. And I looked outside and families were gathering around their tables in their front yards to sit down and eat. In a moment of self-pity, I thought to myself, "I don't have a family. I don't have any food. Jesus, all I have are these chocolate chip cookies." A kind friend who had brought back my mixer that she had borrowed pointed out that I could take those cookies next door to my neighbor and give them to her and most likely she would invite me to her table. And sure enough, that's exactly what happened.
