It's December! All week long I have heard people saying, "I can't believe it's almost Christmas!" As a pastor, I can't believe we are already in the Advent Season!

I recently had someone, a friend who goes to church fairly regularly, tell me, "I look forward to Christmas, and the celebration of Jesus birth, but I don't get this whole Advent thing. What is Advent really all about?

Well, I figured if my friend didn't know, maybe a refresher "Musing" on Advent and what we can do to make Advent meaningful would be a good idea!

What is Advent? Well, the word 'Advent' is from the Latin 'Adventus' which means 'coming.' Advent is the beginning of a new liturgical year (in the Western churches), and encompasses the span of time from the fourth Sunday before Christmas, until Christmas (the celebration of the birth of the Christ-child). The first Sunday of Advent is the Sunday nearest the feast of St. Andrew the Apostle (which is November 30th), and so it will always fall somewhere between November 27th at the earliest and December 3rd at the latest (which is where it falls this year!). The liturgical color for this season is purple (Usually a deep purple as opposed to the lighter, red-violet shade of purple associated with Lent).

Advent is a season of preparation. It has significance because it is a season of looking forward and waiting for something greater. During the Advent Season, we in the church say we are in two "Advents", preparing for two wondrous events as we are preparing for the annual celebration of Christ's birth, and we are also preparing for the time when Christ will come to us again.

So, that's the Season of Advent from a liturgical perspective. But what is Advent supposed to be from a personal perspective.

Well, I believe that this "season", which lasts four weeks or so, offers each of us, personally, opportunities to grow as Christians. It's a time when we can make a choice to slow down and reflect, and allow the Holy Spirit to help us see things from a new perspective.

The Christmas holiday, especially in our country, seems to be on a course toward total insanity. Black Friday (and the commercial enterprises that promote it) appears to have no desire to remain confined by a 24-hour window - the Friday after Thanksgiving. It now bleeds forward into Thanksgiving Day, and backwards for as much as another week. Even though Advent has not yet arrived, the day once set aside for us to "Give Thanks", has become a day for "shopping and getting great deals".

So, I believe Advent takes on an even greater importance for Christians today, as it provides us with another opportunity to pause and give thanks. We need to reflect on God's goodness and give thanks for all God's gifts to us, especially the gift of the Christ-child, if we are to be fully prepared to receive Him.

Advent also provides us with an opportunity to engage in activities that will help us go back to the center, the core of our faith. Whether through daily readings, candle-lightings, or other Advent-

themed traditions, we can use the Season of Advent to reflect and re-center our hearts. Advent is a time to be still and know God.

So, as you celebrate the season of Advent, as we celebrate it together as a church family, I hope you will let this Advent Season be an opportunity for the Spirit of Advent to grow, fill your heart and renew your mind. May it be for you, a time of thankfulness. May it be a time when you reflect on God's goodness to you, and God's patience. May it be a time to reflect and re-center your life on living God's way, the way of Christ Jesus. May Advent not just be a time of preparing for the celebration of Christmas, but may it also be a time when you prepare your heart, mind and soul for Christ to be born again, born anew in your heart!

Why Pray?

Someone once asked me, "If God knows all that we need, as Jesus once said, why do we need to pray?"

Prayer is one of the most important things we can do as a follower of Jesus. Prayer is an act of worship, prayer is an act of thanksgiving, prayer is an act of intercession, prayer is an act of love and relationship. It's a time we are communing with Jesus and communicating with God. While there is deep spiritual meaning in prayer, it doesn't have to be something complicated and difficult. It's something anyone can do anywhere at any time. In fact, the Apostle Paul instructs the early Christians to "pray without ceasing", in other words, to make their lives one constant prayer, one constant conversation with God.

It's impossible to know someone if you don't spend time with them. Prayer is an opportunity to spend time with God. To connect with God, to really understand the heart and the will of God, we need to pray. In John 15:15, Jesus told his disciples, "I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father." For us to know those things, we need to be in a close relationship with Jesus too – we need to be his friend, and make him our friend. I think you already know this, but you cannot be a friend of someone you don't ever talk to, you can't be friends with someone you don't really know!

Talking with God develops a deeper relationship with God. Spending time in the presence of Jesus through quiet conversation, draws you closer to Him and His way of being. Prayer is so important that it is mentioned over 250 times in Scripture.

I spend time each day praying for various people in my life - friends, family, church family, neighbors, organizations, community leaders, political leaders - and the list goes on. Recently, as I was praying, I felt God nudging me to invite my church family to pray with me, to start a prayer ministry at YCUCC. With all that is going on in the lives of people in our church family, with all the adversity that people in our community, our nation, and in the world, are currently facing, such a prayer ministry is needed.

So, I want to invite anyone who is interested in meeting once a week to pray, to join me. I plan to begin this ministry in January after the rush of the holidays is over.

Once I know who wants to be a part of this group, we will meet and discuss a day and time that works. I picture this group meeting for 45-90 minutes, depending on the number of people involved. It will include a short time of check-in, a devotional reading, a lifting up of thanks and concerns, and then a time of both silent prayer and praying out loud.

Most of us grew up feeling that church was a place of refuge and safety. Unfortunately, the shooting at the First Baptist Church in Sutherland Springs, Texas, on Nov. 5 shattered that notion.

When the Shepherds Leadership Team met later that same week, we discussed the shooting and what steps our church could take to keep our members, our children and visitors safe in the event of an attack like the one in Texas.

Our church's Vision Statement says we "Welcome All," and SLT members were not inclined to lock the doors while we gather for worship. However, we decided to reach out to our local law enforcement officials for ideas on what we can do if such an emergency occurs here.

Yorkville Police Chief Rich Hart and Kendall County Sheriff Dwight Baird have agreed to collaborate on presenting a program for our members. Because of other events on our church calendar, this will most likely be scheduled in January.

This comes at a time when the church is in the process of revising and updating our Safe Church Policy. The policy as written now primarily covers measures to protect our children. But we know there is more we need to include.

Following the church shooting in Texas, the state sent all Illinois churches information from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. No doubt many of their suggestions will be included in the revised Safe Church Policy. This includes training of church employees, leaders and members as well as some common sense reminders to be aware of our surroundings in the event of any emergency.

Our Christian Education and Building and Grounds Ministries have prepared the children in Sunday School by holding a trial fire drill but we ALL need to know how and where to exit the church building in the event of a fire. We also need to know where to go in church if there is a tornado warning and what to do in the event of violence at our church.

To help with better communication when scheduling an event or meeting, it was brought to my attention that some clarification of space available and times for these spaces needed to be shared.

- 1. Check the calendar to see if that date is available. The calendar is constantly changing so you need to talk to Mary Ellen. Our church calendar is now a Google calendar posted on our web site.
- Check with Mary Ellen to see what space is available and when can you possible set up for your event. We have several ongoing events that we need to respect when planning a special onetime event. Certain rooms are NOT available until after regular scheduled activates have been completed.

Examples: Coffee Time is every Sunday. They use the kitchen to prepare and set up from 9:00 – 9:45 am. Usually Fellowship Hall is where they host Coffee Time. They generally have the kitchen cleaned up by 12:30 pm. When they know in advance, they can serve Coffee Time in the Narthex. Sunday School program uses the Kid Zone (the low ceiling area) every Sunday. It is part of their weekly program. This area is not available until after 11:30 am.

- 3. Church Safety Policy requires parents to pick up their children after Sunday School. We need to be consistent week after week, so parents know where to go to pick up their children.
- 4. Mary Ellen needs to know who is the **main contact person** for this event. Questions come up and she needs to know who to contact for answers.
- 5. Allowances can be made if there is good communication. Room setup diagrams are posted for Fellowship Hall and the Kid Zone (low ceiling area). You are free to change the room configuration, but you MUST return the space to its original set-up. Please check the posted signs which are in the kitchen, Fellowship Hall and the Kid Zone (low ceiling area). If you leave the room in the condition you found it, everyone is happy.
- 6. Spaces available for events:

The library 4-6 people 3 Classrooms for about 6-8 people Large Meeting room 10-12 people Fellowship Hall 100 – 150 people Kid Zone (low ceiling area) 40 people Kitchen (limited storage in refrigerator is available over night) Sanctuary – 150-200 people

Dear Friends at Yorkville Congregational United Church of Christ,

We gathered at 8:30pm to pray in front of the house that we hoped would be the future home of Casa Tanya – a safe and loving environment where young women from our neighborhood and other places grow into generation changers through the experience of transformative living. This house was strategically located and structurally sound. With tons of potential with renovation it also shared a side yard with a family from a church partnering with us. And right then there was a bidding war going on between our realtor and someone else. We could see on our phones that the bid was creeping up to the maximum price agreed upon by our investors. A quick phone call to one of them who happened to be out of the

country but awake and praying as well and with vision and faith believing that this was to be Casa Tanya's future home, he gave the OK to raise our top bid. And a few hours later, the other bidder dropped out – just two thousand dollars short of our limit! God answered prayer and we are excited to see the ways He will continue to provide for what is needed for renovating this house built in 1910 and designing it to meet the needs of the future women who will come to live in Casa Tanya. Please join us in praying as we trust Him together each step along the way!

My ministry with The Navigators is with one of the missions called I-58 – taken from Isaiah 58 where God asks for worshippers who will partner with Him to renew hope, restore justice and work alongside people to rebuild communities where reconciliation to God, others and oneself can flourish. This is the primary reason I live in Little Village – a predominantly Mexican neighborhood in Chicago and partner with two other staff women in the ministry of Casa Tanya. Also, I am the city leader for other I-58 staff in Chicago as well as serve on the I-58 national staff care team. The staff I lead in Chicago are ministering to people who are reentering life from places of brokenness like prison, homelessness and addiction and walk with them toward wholeness. My ministry is supported by prayer and financial gifts of churches and individuals.
