The Happenings











It seems hard to believe it is January once again. Hard to believe it is the start of another new year – 2018! What will you do with another new year? It won't be the same as the last one, or any other for that matter. But some things will go on the same, won't they? We are creatures of habit, and creatures of routine. So while things in the world will be changing, many of us will be plodding along with our routines and our habitual behaviors – until something comes along that knocks us out of those routines and habits. Have you ever wondered why it takes something like a political change, a tragedy or a natural disaster to change our behaviors, our views, our routines? But I guess it has always been thus. When Jesus came to earth, an event we just celebrated, most people went on about their lives (Even the shepherds after they went to see the baby in Bethlehem, and told about the angels, went back to the routine of being shepherds – see Luke's account of Jesus' birth). But some had their boats swamped with fish, or their sight restored or their limbs healed, or were raised from the dead. Later still, some got knocked off their "high horses". Many had their routines, their daily habits were changed in a flash. And interestingly enough, they then went on to play important roles in changing the lives of others, and even changing the world.

So, as we start this new year, are you going to wait for something to jar you out of your routine, your daily way of living and interacting with the world? Well, a lot of folks choose to live that way. But you could decide to take a few steps out of your comfort zone, and not wait for something to knock you down, turn you around, alter your body, or take something away from you. You could decide to do something different today, this week, this year. Something that might change you, and make you want to change the lives of others.

One of the easiest things you can change is your morning routine. Get up a few minutes earlier and spend a few minutes with the One who came and changed the world. Read a few verses from the Gospels. John is a good place to start, but so is Mark. Read a devotional like the Still Speaking Devotionals the UCC emails out each day, or get a hold of the devotional book, *Jesus Calling*, written by Sarah Young (I really like this book, as it is written as if Jesus is actually talking to you). Spend a few minutes in prayer, asking Him to guide your steps, your words, and your work that day. Then listen for what He might be whispering to your heart or your head. Not a big deal. Not a lot of time. But I promise it will change you, and thus, change your life.

Now I know some of you are reading this and thinking, "Pastors are always telling us to spend more time reading the Bible and praying." Yeah, we are. But only because we know it works. We know it makes a difference in how we see others, how we interact with others, and how we see the world. And it is why you call us to be your pastors — to teach and advise you. But ultimately, the choice is always yours to make. So what are you going to do this year — the same old same old? Or something different?

Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence, but much more now in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure. – Philippians 2:12-13

Join us for our Chili Cookoff & Game Day!!!



They meet each Wednesday at 5:15 and dinner is part of each meeting. The youth have picked some simple foods that they all like, so menus have been set for the rest of this school year.


What they need are volunteers to provide and cook the dinner each week. Rhonda Ladsen had been the cook until she was sidelined by surgery.

The program is expected to last about 45 minutes and there will be an opportunity to ask questions at the end. Child care will be provided so that all parents who want to can attend.
