In the message I gave on Ash Wednesday, I said that it's my hope, that throughout this Lenten Season, rather than dwell on all the ways you have failed God, made yourself unacceptable to God, your sins, your destructive past, on the ways you have added to the division and conflict we see in this world, that you would use this Lenten Season as a time to reflect on how much God loves you. And that rather than dwell on the past, why not make this season a time to look to the future? Someone later told me, "I do think about the future a lot more than the past. But it's not so much that I think about it, I WORRY about it!"

Well, I got me thinking about what Jesus said about "worrying about the future" in Matthew's Gospel:

Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these... indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. "So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today. (Matthew 6:25-29, 32b-35 NRSV)

As good advice goes, for many of us this passage ranks right up there with eat right, exercise, and get plenty of sleep. It makes really good sense... However it seems to defy every instinct and obligation of our daily lives. For the farmers and gardeners among us, you know there are tasks that require your attention, and need to be done in a specific season and with some urgency, or the results are bad and things don't grow and mature. For the business men and women among us, our clients, management and coworkers pretty much demand that we meet goals and deadlines. As members of a family, we know there are priorities of caring for those we love. And we may not be adding a single hour to our lives, but we figure that if we run fast enough and worry about the details, we can forestall a calamity and keep a step ahead.

So, we still worry. So, we still behave like pagans. Clearly if we had more faith we might be able to breathe a sigh of relief and rest in God's arms. But right now it feels like there are places to go and bills to pay.

Why do we find it so difficult to take comfort in knowing that God will take care of all our needs if only we will strive first, seek first, the Kingdom?

The Lenten season offers a wonderful time to let go of worry and to contemplate the future, the Kingdom and God's righteousness. May you find a way to incorporate that, put that first, in your daily practices during this Lenten Season.

But this past Tuesday after Christmas break I returned more rested, more hopeful and more joyfully present with the children. Playing board games and building towers at the beginning during free time is always my favorite. This week instead of staying completely up in the homework room, I was assigned to follow the 1st-4th graders through their afternoon. The Bible lesson involved talking about sin and the choices we make and I had an interesting conversation with Amando (4th grade) about the Holy Spirit and the fruits that can grow in our life when we give our heart to Jesus. We drew a picture together. Then during homework time, I let other volunteers tackle the math but

enjoyed a little girl who was writing a book report on turtles. When I showed her the sign for turtle a big grin broke out across her face and she showed me her assignment book that had the alphabet in sign language and we got a little distracted from the book report while she started spelling everything to me in sign language. She said she was going home to practice on her mom. My walk home this Tuesday was far different and I know that there will be both joys and struggles. For now, it was a good afternoon and I can keep going. I am reminded, "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain." I Corinthians 15:58

Rule of Three: Please do not talk to other members for the first three minutes after the service. Talk only to those you don't know or people you know are guests. It takes guests about three minutes to exit the church after worship and we need to make sure someone has made contact with them before they leave.

The Welcome Center: Consider standing at the Welcome Counter, helping visitors with a name badge, orientating themselves to the church, giving them a welcome treat and introducing them to others. There is a signup sheet in the Narthex.

Our team of painters have now completed painting all the hallways. This spring we will be painting the north side of the building. Watch for the opportunity to lend a hand with this huge project.

This winter has been hard on our parking lot maintenance. We will be addressing the cracks and other areas where water is collecting this spring-summer.
