Saturday, October 6th



Each morning as I watch the morning news, I go from feeling angry, to feeling depressed. Our country is divided. Our government is divided. People are constantly saying mean, rude, even disrespectful things to and about others.

Well, a few weeks ago, on Monday, my day off, I was talking to Michelle about feeling this way (Okay, I'll admit it – I was RANTING about the state of things). She said to me, "Stop watching the news, and what has happened, and think about something that you are looking forward to this week that gives you joy." Wise advice.

As I reflected on Michelle's advice, and my feelings that day (okay, my feelings for the last several months), I wondered to myself, "When did joy become such a difficult thing?" It hadn't always been so hard to find joy.

I grew up in a loving family, that was pretty healthy, emotionally. We weren't wealthy, but we always had enough to eat, a roof over our heads, warm clothes in the winter, and my siblings and I knew that we were going to go to college. We felt loved, and wanted, and appreciated. I grew up with the privilege of happiness, with an overabundance of joy.

But as life progressed and I started moving about in the real world, I started to discover all the places of overabundant woe.

It seems to me that these days I am seeing a whole lot more of those places of overabundant woe than I believed I'd ever see in this country. And all the death, all the destruction, the lack of honesty and integrity, and the violence in the news, coupled with the lack of compassion and the hateful words that are so common on social media, all those things were starting to turn me into somewhat of a bummer to be around. And as I thought about that, I began to realize, that as joy gets harder and harder to hang on to, it becomes more & more necessary.

Paul, the patron saint of the try-harder's, in his letter to the Philippian Christians writes (from prison no less) that joy is vital. "Rejoice in the Lord always. Again, I say Rejoice!". But Paul reframes joy for us from a feeling that depends on the world around us, to something that has its basis in something way more trustworthy, way more dependable. He tells the Philippians to "Rejoice in the Lord," together and always. To find their joy in the one who is the great redeemer and reconciler. For it is in Christ that they will find the remedy for the divisions in their community. Joy is the antidote to their anxiety. Joy is the gateway to knowing peace.

And Paul's words are as true for us today as they were for those early Christians in Philippi. We must not focus on the prison we feel we are in, or the issues that divide us, for we will never find joy, peace, hope, or love in any of those things. We need to look to Christ, the great redeemer and reconciler of all people. Rejoice in the Lord, for it is in Him that we will always find JOY! It is in Him, that we will find unity and peace.

We can't fix other people or make them behave differently. But we can choose how we will let them affect us. We can make the choice to let our joy depend on the ways of the world, or we can choose to find joy in the Lord and allow Christ to fix our responses to the world and the people in it.

So, rejoice daily, rejoice deeply, rejoice fully, and let the love, grace, and healing power of Christ transform your sorrow (anger and depression too) into joy.

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you. – Philippians 4:1-9 (NRSV)

## An opportunity for Our Church to Serve Our Community



Our YCUCC's Goals: To impact our community and show the love of Jesus to every person that we encounter. We wish to show the love, compassion, and grace that Jesus showed everyone He encountered. We hope that you will join us in accomplishing our goals.

With these goals in mind, the SLT is fully supporting Our Church, Yorkville Congregational United Church of Christ, in hosting World Relief's Citizenship Clinic on March 16, 2019 from 7am – 5pm. Our church building has been vetted and approved to meet the needs of hosting this clinic.

Who is World Relief? What is a Citizenship Clinic?

First, World Relief of DuPage/Aurora is a Christ-centered organization that partners with local churches and works with hundreds of individuals as well as community groups to offer a comprehensive range of services to refugees and immigrants living in DuPage and Kane Counties. These services are Refugee Resettlement & Integration, Immigration Legal Services, English Language Training, Employment Services, Children & Youth Programs, and Volunteer & Church Mobilization. For our purpose, our church will be working with World Relief Immigration Legal Services. They provide quality, compassionate, and affordable immigration assistance, and are recognized by the Department of Justice to provide legal representation. World Relief Dupage/Aurora Immigration Legal Services (ILS) team consists of two staff attorneys, six accredited specialists, two paralegals, and two administrative assistants. Please visit their website at <u>www.worldreliefdupageaurora.org</u> for more in depth explanations of their other services.

This leads us to the question what is a World Relief Citizenship Clinic? World Relief works with churches, pro bono attorneys, and community organizations to provide compassionate, professional services to help refugees and immigrants – particularly those that cannot afford a private attorney and are most likely to be taken advantage of – navigate the complex immigration system and become U.S. citizens. World Relief ILS team and pro bono attorney screen potential applicants (Legal Permanent Residents), who are then assisted in completing the application by trained volunteers.

Now, you may be wondering what else besides a building to host this event is needed from our awesome church ......VOLUNTEERS. Many COMMITTED VOLUNTEERS will be needed to make this event a success. This is the breakdown that is needed from our church: 6-10 volunteers to help as runners between each station, 2-3 volunteers to help with food serving and welcoming clients, and 10-15 volunteers to serve as application preparation volunteers. All volunteers must submit an application; go through volunteer orientation training and for those who will be helping with application preparation there will be additional training on the application. The application is very short and can be done online at <a href="https://worldreliefdupageaurora.org/volunteer-application">https://worldreliefdupageaurora.org/volunteer-application</a>.

The last part of this is the community, our goal is to communicate our event far and wide to our community as well as other communities at this incredible event. In the coming months, there will be more detailed information/conversation about volunteer positions, communication details to the community as well as general needs of the clinic. We will need EVERYONE in our wonderful congregation supporting this event. I know people our church can make this a successful event that will "impact our community and show the love of Jesus to every person that we encounter." Our Building and Grounds Team have been installing the new magnetic door lock for the front interior door and camera system to follow our Church Safety Policy. The installation of the magnetic lock was not that easy. Norm took the project home and created a diagram of the wiring. He would get up in the middle of the night and work on the project. With diagram in hand, Norm Kuhman, Tony Houle and Jim Davis started to install the system. All three guys were thrilled when it worked!

Next came the camera system. We have a camera on the front door, another one in the Narthex facing the front door and a third camera pointed towards the south exit door. Liz Cronshaw, our Administrative Assistant, can view the system from her desk monitor. That makes three cameras in operation now with five more to be added later. These five cameras will cover all five entrances with night vision up to 65 feet. For now the three cameras are in operation.

The security system will most likely be in operation on Mondays and Fridays when Liz is the only staff person working in the church. All the other days, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays the magnetic door lock will be open. It will also be open on non-office hours and evenings. The camera system is always on. It will only record motion during closed hours.

Our Building and Grounds men have saved our church big money by doing the installation. We are very fortunate to have these talented men willing to donate their time and talents.

Andy Hamblin has been very busy helping with several Sunday School improvements. He has been painting the old metal chairs with colorful attractive colors for the classrooms and painting cabinets. With the rummage sale fast approaching, he has been picking up donations and storing them in the garage. The garage is now full; however, our men will be helping during the rummage sale week to load and unload items.

We had our yearly furnace cleaning and inspection done. We discovered that one AC unit will need to be replaced this spring and one of our original furnaces needs to be replaced now.

We have scheduled to have the church carpet cleaned after the rummage sale. All the classrooms and office areas will have their open space areas cleaned. This is probably the first time for these areas. The Narthex, Fellowship Hall, Kid Zone and hallways will be cleaned. The chancel area and main isles will be cleaned in the sanctuary.

Our church calendar is an important communication tool when scheduling events and special programs. The goggle calendar is updated weekly after our staff meeting. Please check that calendar when planning your event or program and then contact me with your information for the church calendar.
