A couple weeks ago, something reminded me of a story from English history. It was during the Reign of Oliver Cromwell, and the British government had begun to run low on silver for minting coins. Lord Cromwell figured that there had to be some silver in the Exeter Cathedral, so he dispatched men to investigate the Cathedral. They were instructions to report back to Lord Cromwell with Information about what they found. When they returned, they told Lord Cromwell that the only silver they could find in the cathedral were the statues of the saints (the 12 Apostles). Hearing the news, Cromwell declared, “Good! We will melt down the saints and put them in circulation!”

I’ve always liked that story, because it expresses some very sound theology, not only about the role the apostles/disciples played in spreading the Christian faith as they circulated throughout the Middle East, Asia, and Europe after the resurrection, but also about the role each of us is called to play in spreading the Christian faith in our community, in the world, today.

Think of all the places you “circulate” during the average week. Your place of employment. The Jewel, Aldi’s, Target, Walmart, Menards. Your bridge club. The Legion Hall. The little league field, the soccer field, the football field, the ice rink where your kids play and parents gather to watch. At the nursing home, and the hospital, and the rehab facility. I’m sure you can name many others.

Now I know that we Christians can sometimes begin to feel like we have done our part to help the church and grow the faith by attending church for a couple hours every week. But being a “saint in the church” on Sunday is not really fulfilling Jesus commission given to the 12, and passed down to every disciple of Jesus over the centuries – to go and make disciples of all nations, all people. To fulfill that role, that responsibility, each one of us must be a “saint in circulation”. We can’t just be Sunday “silver saints in shining armor.” Imagine where the church would be today, if the first disciples had decided to just go to church on Sunday and go back to life as usual every other day. Instead, they told their stories about a life with Jesus. And the world began to change.

I believe that we go to church on Sunday to get melted down by the grace of Christ, to get refined by the power of the Spirit, and get minted into a currency God can use to feed the hungry, heal the sick and broken, to transform this world into a place God intends it to be. So we can go out into the world and share the Good News, share our stories about how God has blessed us, how Christ has transformed us, with people who are lost in the darkness of depression or oppression, with people who see their future as hopeless, with folks weighed down by the day to day struggle of surviving in this broken and conflicted world of ours.

As I said in a recent sermon, we don’t have to preach Jesus to every person we meet. But when asked to do something unethical at work, or when out with friends, we can say, “I’m sorry, but my faith won’t let me do that. I follow Jesus and his teachings, and they both tell me this is not the right way.” When helping a neighbor or a co-worker or a stranger at a local store, and they express gratitude for your help, you can say, “I help others because that’s what Jesus did, and I try each day to be more like him.”

I know it’s tempting, and easier to simply be a “Sunday Saint”, going to church every Sunday, giving your offering, singing the hymns, smiling and talking with all the other good folks.

But I believe that the Lord (not Cromwell) is always calling for an inspection of the cathedral, to see if there’s any saints inside that can be melted down and put into circulation. It’s always up to you. You have been and will continue to be given God’s love and forgiveness, Christ’s grace and peace. But if you keep refusing to let God use you in circulation, you will never fully know the treasure you are, and never know just how valuable you can be in this world.

From the Desk of the (Vice) Chair

Fall is here and so are our packed schedules. Sunday School is humming along, the choirs and spaghetti dinners are all ramped up again, and we have another rummage sale under our belts. Even so, October is set to bring in some more action. There are many opportunities for staying connected with your church family, serving those in need and getting out into the community.

- Alpha Youth Group starts first Fridays on October 4th
- Fall Festival is fun for the family on Saturday, October 5th
- Information Sunday follows worship on October 6th
- Soup Sunday fund raiser benefiting Special Olympics follows worship on October 20th
- PADS (Public Action to Deliver Shelter) starts Mondays at YCUCC on October 21st with orientation on October 14th
- YCUCC will participate in Biz Boo, an annual trick or treat event organized by the Yorkville Area Chamber of Commerce on Saturday, October 26th

We are an active church, we are a growing church, and we are a healthy church. Part of being a healthy church is maintaining our physical building. It is important that the physical appearance and function of our church building represent the vitality of our congregation.

We have had so many facelift projects completed in the recent past such as painting the siding, refinishing the wood around the entryway, replacing windows and continual landscaping maintenance. We are extremely thankful for the time, talents and funding that went into those endeavors. However, we have large projects afoot that require the entire congregation to come together with their support. Individual heroics by a small minority are not going to suffice for these projects. We need one and all.

Most eminent of these projects is the replacement of our weather damaged roof set to occur in the spring of 2020. The existing shingles will be removed and new shingles will be placed on top of a new ventilation space to maximize the life of the shingles. The damaged skylights will also be replaced. The total cost of this endeavor is \$87k. However, the timing of the repair allows us to take advantage of \$55k available from insurance claims related to wind and hail damage. We are also capping the repair off with an improved gutter system that will cost an additional \$5k. The total cost left for the church to pay is about \$37,000. This, if we don't do something about it, will bring the churches capital reserve fund down to \$0.

This is where you come in! We are an active and growing church, but large, one-time capital expenses put a heavy burden on our finances. Not only do we need an increase to pledged and ongoing giving to weather future storms and maintain a positive cash flow, but we need additional dedicated contributions for our immediate needs. Please consider stuffing some envelopes on Sunday mornings with something a little extra to get us over this hump, as well as a healthy bump to your weekly or monthly pledged donations to stay above water. It will take all of us!

Outside projects are still being done. The men on the building and grounds committee put in many hours doing projects to keep the building in good shape. They are also on call for church functions for set up and take down tables and chairs.

We do have some good news that we have a signed contract to replace the single roofs. With fall fast approaching, we are going to wait until spring to complete this large project. Advanced Roofing has agreed to keep us watertight during this waiting period at no additional cost to us and our insurance company has no problem with us waiting until spring to complete the project.

Our shingle roof needed replacement from storm damage. We have not had any roof leaks under the shingle roof. The flat roof liner appears to be in good condition. All of the roof leaks come from areas where the flat roof meets the shingle roof. It appears that the liner does not go up high enough under the shingles to hold it in place. The weight and speed of the water running down the steep roof after a heavy rain causes the liner to pull out from under the shingles and then allows the water to drip into the building. At times the water dripping is like a waterfall because so much water is running down the steep roofs.

The other area of concern is the perimeter of the flat roof areas. Water builds up so fast that it cascades over the edge and down the siding. Our men are attempting to correct this issue and we hope that by adding gutters and more downspouts that will help stop this from happening in the future. We are still waiting to see if we are entitled to more insurance money for our three damaged skylight windows.



The building and grounds men have been busy behind the scenes getting things ready for the rummage sale; finding storage areas for early items dropped off, picking up items from church members for the sale and helping with the set up of tables, racks and placing signs out in the community. If you are available to help with outside projects this fall, please share your contact information and we can send you an email with dates and times along with information about what projects they will be attacking. Help is always appreciated and you will enjoy working with this crew.

Fall programs are starting and building use is increasing. When planning your meeting or special event, please check the church calendar on our web page to see if there will be a conflict with other ministries and what space is available. We will do our best to assist you and your event.

Missions will continue to be a vital part of CE programming. We collected cereal for the Kendall County Food Pantry in September. In November we will work on a new mission. "The Shoe That Grows" is an innovative ministry that creates shoes that can grow 5 sizes! 

God was bringing forth the vision I had so many years ago of a safe and loving environment for women in difficult places to move forward in their lives in community through a house in Little Village called Casa Tanya; however, not without a few speed bumps along the way! Praise God that the house will be move-in ready next month.

The Joys (the gifts): 1) Matthew. Matt lived with me for three months this summer and having face to face time hearing about what he's learning and just everyday life with him for a brief time – that was such a gift! His return to college at TSU in San Marcos is a gift as well. 2) Peter and Bethany. I love their God story of His faithfulness and their love for one another! My joy is in their trust in God and in anticipating their wedding on October 20 and the gift of having Bethany be a part of our family! 3) Dad. I find joy in the gift of time with my father every week and hearing him call me "Sissy" as well as knowing that my mom is waiting for him whenever Jesus calls him home.

For all of these things and so much more, I say thank you to God, for this wonderful, wild ride in life and I say, thank you, friends, for joining with me!


