TIM's TALES

"I am so frustrated" is a refrain of our times. As the long winter lingers and we are again caged by Covid into cautious living, many of us are expressing frustration with life, Covid, death, and a larger sense of not knowing the future. Friends, that is big frustration.

Counselors report that new patients arrive with heightened anxiety instigated by the Covid pandemic. For these people the regular grind of life becomes unmanageable because the pandemic makes living that much more difficult. Frustration grows bigger.

I too share many frustrations around Covid which surrounds us with death and uncertainty. I address my frustrations the way psychologists suggest

- name the cause of the frustration
- see the frustration in context
- explore options of how to address the frustration
- decide on a course of action
- act on and hold to your decision

In my spiritual arsenal I have a bazooka that blasts frustration, helps control my anger and gives me personal peace.

1 Peter 5:7 "Cast all your anxiety on God, because God cares for you."

Prayer is a conversation with God and in my frequent prayers I bring my frustrations to God. God listens, patiently as I name the burdens of frustration I carry. Then God takes them from me, so I needn't carry them any longer. I know it seems magical and it is. The prayer frees me from my anger and disappointment and often guides me to a decision that relieves me of my frustration.

Sometimes it doesn't work the first, third or thirty-third time I pray, and I need to pray again and again. Still, in delightful ways God takes my burden and sets me free.

So, when you're gnashing your teeth and are frozen by frustration, take time to pray and feel the release of God's peace.

On January 9th we woke up to an icy glazed over landscape. The main roads were open, but the side roads and driveways were solid ice. Pastor Tim contacted our snow removal people and had them come back to salt the parking lot. Bob Thurlby and Jeff Kline used what salt we had to spread on the sidewalks. At our Tuesday morning meeting, following Sunday's ice situation, a plan was created to follow if we find ourselves in a icy situation again.

The building and grounds men have replaced with LED light bulbs the exterior light fixtures on the south side of the church. They replaced the reflecting tape in the choir loft, chancel area, and steps. They also reglued carpet areas in the chancel. Next, they plan to do some wall painting areas that were damaged from roof leaks.

We want to thank Jeff and Julie Kline for donating a slightly used snowblower. It will be put to good use in keeping the church sidewalks open.

We have a new kitchen refrigerator thanks to the Joy Circle ladies. Diane Dillow spent numerous hours locating a commercial refrigerator.

Future plans for this committee – we will investigate what areas of the parking lot that need to be replaced. We are looking to do the repair in stages to help spread out the cost over four years. We are slowly replacing windows. We have ten windows to replace over the next five years.

This spring we will have the shingle and flat roof inspected according to our warrantee agreements. We will also be working on the church gardens and landscapes.

We are looking forward to the Green Group presentation about what we can do to help our heating and cooling efficacy. Be sure to put this event on your calendar. The date is February 20th at 11:15 a.m. with a light "boxed lunch" in Fellowship Hall.

'One Great Hour of Sharing' (OGHS), is our next 5 for 5 Offering to be collected on March 27, 2022.




Sunday School




Spiritual Development Group



Solar Panels for Yorkville Congregational UCC

Fighting Climate Change - One Project at a Time

In the midst of the second year of the pandemic, Green Group resumed meeting - virtually - nearly a year ago, to revitalize our commitment to one of core beliefs YCUCC: **Our responsibility to be good stewards of the earth and environment.**

A project was suggested to the group by one of our newer members: Could solar panels be put on the church roof to generate energy? How much fossil-fuel produced energy could be reduced by the use of solar panels? Would solar panels help to bring down the cost of electricity?

We were ENERGIZED Into looking into this idea and formed a Solar Panel Research Team, which met regularly and often through 2021. Research included: what other churches in northern Illinois used solar panels, and how did they accomplish that? What type of design would work on our building? What would be needed structurally - best location? placement? What is the annual cost of electric at YCUCC? How many panels would be needed to produce enough electricity to offset part or all of that cost? What would be the cost of solar panels? How will it be funded? Could we get a grant to cover some of the cost? What company will work with churches?

Without going into notebooks full of the details, we want to announce the result of our extensive research and decisions reached with Green Group and support of SLT.

YCUCC WILL GET 30 SOLAR PANELS IN SPRING OF 2022!

Panels will be an "awning" adjacent and parallel to the south roof of the church. The panels will <u>not</u> be on the roof itself as to not affect the warranty of our new, specially-designed roof and shingles.

Communication: The Solar Panel Research Team stayed in communication with our Shepherds Leadership Team through the past year. On September 9th we virtually presented a detailed power point and had another follow-up discussion with SLT. There was much interest and enthusiasm for this environmental project. But the biggest concern and challenge was to find a way to fund this project without touching the church's budget and operating funds. The funding was accomplished to meet this goal.

Funding: The cost of the project will be fully covered without affecting the church operating funds. Costs will be covered by (a) ComEd's rebate energy credits to be \$3,045 after the system starts working, (b) State of Illinois's SREC's projected to be \$12,586 and distributed during the first year, (c) private donations from climate-concerned members of the church, and (d) a very generous grant!

A grant: The grant has been awarded from Faith in Place, an affiliate of Interfaith Power and Light.* YCUCC applied for and received the second (of only two) available grants offered in 2021! The amount of the grant is \$10,000. The church has already received the first installment.

Construction: The project will be done by Independent Renewable Energy (IRE) from Sandwich Illinois. When the very cold winter subsides, materials and the construction team from IRE will be ready to install solar panels. Watch for the action!

Savings: Using some solar powered energy with the awnings, the projected amount of savings is expected to be 16,890 kWh production and \$1337 (approximately 1/3 of YCUCC's average yearly cost). Over the next ten years, the projected amount of financial savings is \$15,064. Think about how that amount of money can be directed to other mission work of the church!

Happy Valentine's Day to my Church Family, you are my heart








