Stephen Ministry team shares a story from a <u>real person</u> who received care from a Stephen Minister during a difficult time. <u>This is NOT about a care receiver from our church, as all</u> <u>conversations and information shared are kept confidential</u>. These real people have given Stephen Ministries organization permission to share their experience.

Helping dad hang on during a personal earthquake

Stephen Minister Jim describes the events that rock our lives--death, divorce, illness, unemployment--as personal earthquakes. In the face of such earthquakes, Jesus tells us to "**Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.**" Matthew 11:28. Stephen Ministers help people endure their earthquakes while holding on to Christ. Jim was the Stephen Minister for Jay, a young dad who learned that his pregnant wife was carrying a severely handicapped baby whom doctors said would not live long after birth. Stephen Minister Jim and care receiver Jay met for months before the birth and following the baby boy's birth and subsequent death, one hour after his birth. In talking about his relationship with his Stephen Minister, Jay says "the great thing about Jim was that I could talk about the difficult thing that everyone else was afraid to talk about". Jim knew how to provide care and comfort without offering trite platitudes such as "It's God's will", "He's no longer in pain." or "Everything happens for the good." "I don't know what I would have done without my Stephen Minister," continues Jay. It has been wonderful to be able to talk with another man. The truth is that our grief has to be expressed. I think many men have a need but feel afraid to seek help."

Spring is finally coming, and we are so ready to enjoy it. The Building and Grounds members are getting quotes for grass mowing and snow removal to be done by one company. The B & G men put a speaker in the nursery room so the staff taking care of our little ones can listen to the worship service. They hung a television on the wall in fellowship hall to be used for presentations.

We have started preparing our budget for next year. We are adding a new line item called **preventive maintenance work.** These items we hope should help prolong the life of our equipment. An example would be to have our air conditioners and furnaces cleaned and checked for problems. Another example would be to fill cracks and sealcoat the parking lot. If we do not keep up with general maintenance, costly replacement will occur.

This summer the men plan to paint the south side of the church and install two replacement windows. There will also be a spring garden cleanup which will coincide with the city brush pick up schedule. Watch for more information about this project in the April newsletter.

SAVE \$\$ and Energy with HOURLY PRICING PROGRAM

The country is currently experiencing a rise in electricity prices due to volatility in the energy market. Due to the fluctuations in hourly prices, using electricity during periods of high demand may have a higher impact on monthly bills.

We understand these unexpected price fluctuations can be frustrating. ComEd does not set the price of each kWh of energy that Hourly Pricing participants pay, nor does ComEd mark up or make any profit on the price of electricity.

What is hourly pricing? To manage your costs with ComEd's Hourly Pricing program, you can shift some of your electricity use to hours when real-time prices tend to be low, such as night and weekend hours.

In general, the best times to reduce energy use in the winter are 8–11 a.m. and 5–8 p.m.

Here are some tips to help you shift some of your electricity use to low price times and use electricity wisely in general. Avoid heating or cooling your home more than needed.

- Adjust the thermostat setting when away from home or sleeping. You can save around 10 percent a year on cooling and heating bills by turning your thermostat setting up or down 7°F to 10°F for eight hours per day (U.S. Department of Energy). Use a programmable thermostat to conserve energy automatically.
- **Do the laundry** during hours when the price of electricity is low. Use cold water when possible to cut water heating costs.
- **Charge devices** such as cell phones and cordless tools at night when electricity prices are low. Unplug the charger from the outlet when not in use.
- **Run the dishwasher** when electricity prices are low. If your dishwasher has a timer or "delay start" function, you can use it to automatically start the cycle during lower priced hours. Use the "energy saver" or "no heat dry" option to save even more energy.
- **Reduce wasted "standby" power** that is used by electronics that are not in use. Unplug electronics or use a power strip to shut off power to multiple electronic devices at once.
- **Use energy efficient lighting** such as LED bulbs and make sure lights are turned off when not in use.

The Morris Theater Guild, a local community theater group, is producing "The Diary of Anne Frank" on March 6th, 2022 at 2:30 pm. You, your family, and friends are invited to join a group from Yorkville Congregational UCC to travel to Morris to experience the story of Anne Frank and her family, presented on the Morris Theater Guild stage.

Here is your part in preparing for this special trip together with the YCUCC community:

- 1) Look at the flyer below from the Morris Theater Guild about the production.
- 2) You will see the matinee production on Sunday, March 6 @ 2:30 p,m. You will also see the web address and a phone number for the Morris Theater Guild, and the cost of tickets.
- 3) Determine how many people will be in your group for that 2:30 p.m. matinee performance. Have your credit card handy. Go online or by telephone and order your ticket(s). (A hint: Do the ordering NOW because news is the tickets are going fast!)
- 4) Pastor Tim Rhodes and Rev. Michael Obenauer are co-leaders for this special group experience on Sunday, March 6th at 2:30 p.m. Let one of the co-leaders or Liz in the church office know you have your ticket(s). We need to know how many tickets so plans can be made for carpooling.
- 5) The YCUCC group will gather in the front parking lot of the church building at 12:45 p.m. on Sunday, March 6th to make the trip together to Morris.

The main doors of the Theater lobby open at 1 p.m. The Theater Guild will have several displays in the Lobby to enhance and deepen our understanding of the experience of Anne Frank and her family, the Holocaust setting of World War II, and the significance of this story for us today.

Anne Frank was a young, Jewish teenager in the Netherlands during World War II. She died in a Nazi Concentration Camp. The subject matter of the play is her diary, which can be quite intense and complex to understand. As you plan, you certainly will want to consider including middle school, junior high, and high school in your group. The experience might be too much for younger children.

A personal note from Michael Obenauer: Some of you may know or remember my stepson, Matthew Johnson. Matthew is the director of this production of "The Diary of Anne Frank." He is also "a child of the Yorkville Congregational United Church of Christ." His nurture in this congregation has helped to bring Matthew to this point in life. Thanks, from a proud father!

It is the hope of the co-leaders that this will be highly memorable, deeply moving experience, given additional meaning by sharing it with the YCUCC community of faith. If you have questions or want to talk about possibilities, please know that Pastor Tim and Michael look forward to engaging you. We hope to see you in the March 6th Matinee group!

Refugees are Welcomed into their first USA "Homes"

Afghan and Refugee Numbers - In the fall/winter of 2021, World Relief resettled nearly 300 Afghan refugees across Chicagoland. They anticipate resettling 700+ additional refugees by October of 2022. How exciting!

World Relief set up 29 homes in November, 24 homes in December, and 25 in January across the region. Men, women, and children found safe, comfortable apartments or homes - a real place of refuge.
