March 7, 2021 was big day at YCUCC. It was our first time back to in-person worship service during the pandemic. There were two services offered with no more than 50 people in the building at one time, and seating was by reservation only. Access was restricted to the sanctuary, and everyone was masked. There were no choirs singing, no hymnals or Bibles in the pews, no passing of the peace or the

offering plates. We sat at least 6 feet away from any other household. But we were back. Sort of.

Here we are, two years later, and we find that we are back in many more ways. Our church is active, vibrant, and growing. This past month we have been averaging about 130 people in worship each week including our online congregants. The Wednesday night Bible study group led by Pastor Elizabeth is outgrowing the conference room. Our youth are working toward their summer mission trip, the first one in quite some time. It's different than it was three years ago. And two years ago. And even last year. Different, but alive and growing.

As we find ourselves welcoming in March 2023, may we also find ourselves empowered by this community of faith to be the hands and feet of Jesus. No longer are we bound by the restrictions of the pandemic. In this freedom that we all longed for, let us reach out with one another and celebrate the fact that we can work side by side (literally) and live out our YCUCC mission:

To live as Jesus lived: love without judgement, welcome without exception, serve with compassion, teach by example.

What has Building and Grounds been up to?

Happy March! It is crazy to think that we are already into the third month of 2023. Some of you might be wondering what the building and grounds crew have been up to.

For starters, after receiving several estimates for a new boiler we have settled on a price and the contracts have been signed. We are not going to install the new boiler this cold season. Instead, we are going to purchase it now and have Artlip and Sons hold it for us until September, before next winter arrives. If you have any questions about this process please feel free to ask myself or any of the building and grounds crew.

This past week, the crew replaced one of the sprayers in the kitchen. While they were replacing the sprayer the went in and repaired some of the faucets. The faucets and sprayer needed to be repaired and replaced due to some pretty consistence dripping. The dripping can be caused by forcing the handles of the faucet down too hard. So, we are asking you to not force the handles down. When you first turn the faucet off there will be a drip, but it will stop after a couple of seconds. The more you force the handles down, the more we have to fix them.

Our current project is the fire suppression system in the kitchen. This past month, the hood and vents above the stove were cleaned. In July the wet chemical in the suppression system will be out of fire code. We are talking with a few fire protection companies to make sure we get the best price. We do not have a date for this installation, so stay tuned.

If you are interested and able, please join us on March 3rd at 1:00 pm, in the Fellowship Hall as we make bagged lunched for the Hesed House. Please be on the look out for a sign up sheet for donations. As always, we continue to meet every Tuesday morning at 9:00 am, all are welcome.

Fighting hunger at Daybreak Homeless Shelter each month

For the past two years, members of our church have been addressing hunger once a month by serving lunch on the third Friday at Daybreak Homeless Shelter in Joliet.

Brian Bazan and Sandy Lindblom (pictured) are among the faithful servers. It took all of the food in these insulated carriers in the foreground to feed lunch to Daybreak residents on Jan. 20. Nine members of our church (Sandy, Brian, Kathy Farren, Coral Clevenger, Peg Trumble, Diane Dillow, Sandy DeRidder, Anne Engelhardt, and Mary Ann Doetschman) provided and cooked the dinner of ham, potato casserole, green beans and dessert. It takes quite a bit to feed between 35 and 50 Daybreak residents every month so the list of needed food is split up so no one has to provide all of any one item. Daybreak residents really appreciate the home cooked food.

This began as a project of Kendall County PADS to do something to help the homeless when that program at local churches shut down during COVID in 2020. Since then, Kendall County PADS disbanded and the monthly Daybreak lunch became a project of Yorkville Congregational United Church of Christ and Cross Lutheran Church. Members of the two churches provide the food in alternate months and members of YCUCC deliver and serve the meal.

Can you help provide the food for lunch March 17?

It will be YCUCC's turn to provide lunch again on Friday, March 17. The menu will be meat loaf, macaroni and cheese, green beans and dessert. We need donations of four 3-pound meat loaves, four pans of macaroni and cheese, two large bags of frozen green beans, and three desserts. THE PROBLEM - SINGLE USE PLASTICS

1,000,000,000s of items of plastic waste are choking our oceans, lakes, and rivers. It is an ugly-looking pileup on land. It harms plants, wildlife, and humans. All of this has occurred in less than 100 years! Plastics were first produced for use in the 1930's. Plastic bottles were introduced in the 1960's while grocery and garbage bags emerged in the 1980's. Roughly half of annual plastic production is destined for a single-use product.



SOLUTIONS - FOR SINGLE USE PLASTICS

- Since ten cents of every shopping dollar is used to pay for packaging, purchase the largest sizes you will use. You will save money, reduce waste, and help the environment.
- Over 90% of plastic is not recycled. Recycling would reduce oil consumption and plastic waste.
- By using a REUSABLE water bottle the average person could save an average of 156 plastic bottles annually.
- By switching to REUSABLE shopping bags, we can eliminate that waste which amounts to about 307 bags per person a year.

Meals usually take between two weeks and six months to travel to their destination. It all depends on where in the world they go and how hard it is to get there. They cross the ocean by ship or plane and wait in line to clear customs. Then they journey by car, bike, canoe or even donkey to reach FMSC partners. Many hands carry these meals to children and families in need.






