

Embracing the Seasons of Life and Faith at YCUCC

As the sweltering heat of summer gradually gives way to the cool embrace of fall, we find ourselves eagerly anticipating the changing colors of trees and the sense of renewal that comes with the shifting seasons. Just as the garden at home flourishes with ripe tomatoes, vibrant greens, and peppers, the school year commences, and the program year at YCUCC unfolds.

The rhythm of fall and harvest serves as a poignant reminder of the intricate cycle of life. Within the heart of our church community, pastoral and congregational care values have always held a paramount place. This sacred duty is not only well-executed within our congregation but is also evolving to new heights. Guided by the compassionate efforts of the Care Team, our program is expanding to include congregational visits that weave stronger threads between individuals and the broader congregation.

As the pastor, I continue to extend my presence to those confined to their homes and those seeking help in hospitals. These moments of connection witness the profound importance of pastoral care, especially during life's most delicate transitions. Reflecting on the passage from the "Time of Dying" liturgy, we find solace in envisioning a realm where pain dissipates, and vulnerability becomes a connection with God. The words resound, "Fill their eyes with light that they may see beyond human sight, a home of your love, where the pain is gone, and physical frailty becomes glory. Banish fear and wipe away tears."

In the upcoming weeks, our congregational journey will be illuminated by thought-provoking sermons that resonate with the very essence of human experience and divine teachings:

9/10 - "What Time Is It?"

Drawing from Romans 13:8-14, this sermon delves into the commandment to love our neighbor as ourselves. Our conversation will embrace the legacy of compassion epitomized by Mr. Rogers.

9/17 - "Stretching and Believing"

From the narrative of Exodus 14:19-31, we learn the significance of trusting in a higher power, even in the face of seemingly insurmountable obstacles. This sermon encourages us to mirror the act of stretching out one's hand in faith, akin to the characters in The Matrix.

9/24 - "It's Not About Fair"

Centered around Matthew 20:1-16, this sermon reflects on the inclusive call that leaves no one behind. The profound lesson is this verse, "the last shall be first, and the first shall be last," reminding us that God's love is for all. Drawing parallels to the narrative of "A Wrinkle in Time," we understand that the fabric of time holds lessons of justice.

These sermons and reflections are threads knitted together and woven seamlessly into the tapestry of our communal journey. Just as fall brings changing colors to nature, our congregation is poised to embrace the multi-hued experiences of life, faith, and human connection. In every congregational visit, in each comforting presence, and through the wisdom of scripture, we are reminded that the cycles of life echo the divine love that unites us all.

YCUCC members Carrie and Louis DeFuss and Lou Ann Hoffman traveled to Indianapolis, Indiana on June 30-July 2 to attend the General Synod 34, a biennial meeting for the United Church of Christ. As visitors, not delegates, we were not 'official' voting representatives, but rather 'observers' of the workings of the United Church of Christ. Assembled in the huge Indiana Convention Center were 2,000 UCC folks—pastors, members, and guests, plus some 75 Youth. Attendees from all parts of the world shared in large group sessions: energizing worship, inspiring speakers, a banquet, Celebrated the 170th Anniversary of the Church Building & Loans, and perused vendor offerings in the Exhibit Hall. We sat in on small breakouts to learn about the proposed resolutions of this General Synod. One of our highlights was our active participation in assembling "Period Packs". The generous donation of over \$500 from YCUCC helped purchase hygiene materials. With a goal to assemble 1,000 packs, delegates, visitors, youth gathered to worked together surpass the goal and complete 4,250 hygiene kits, quadrupling the goal. Over \$23,000 was collected to purchase hygiene products. Packs are to be distributed with the help of Church World Service. THANKS, YCUCC!

The following points highlight the resolutions and bylaw changes proposed at General Synod 34.

- Celebrating the 170th anniversary of the Church Building and Loan Fund
- Affirming and authorizing licensed and commissioned ministers
- Denouncing the Dobbs decision and proclaiming abortion as healthcare
- Calling for a study on relationship with Indian Boarding schools in Hawaii
- Seeking digital justice and inclusion
- Urging electrification as a way to protect the earth from climate change emissions
- Affirming/supporting gun violence prevention
- Join to fund revitalization of Hawaiian Language Education programs
- Encouraging a plant-based life (resolution rejected)
- Take action to reduce/free plastic pollution
- Support academic freedom and equity efforts in schools
- Study and develop reparation proposals for African Americans
- Condemnation of prolonged solitary confinement as a form of torture
- Affirming the human dignity of transgender and nonbinary persons
- Witness/confront a "White Supremacy"
- Change General Synod meetings from every two years to every three years




Adult Education

The **fall book** will be *Heartland*, *A Memoir of Working Hard and Being Broke in the Richest Country on Earth* by Sarah Smarsh.


The author grew up on a farm in Kansas barely getting by despite her and her family's hard work. In the book, she explores how and why the working class in America is barely getting by.
