# The Happenings

March 2024







Dear Church Family,

How do you renew? I renew my body, mind, and spirit through active prayer, meditation, reflection, reading, yoga, cooking, and being outside. How do communities renew? Communities renew by engaging in collective prayer, worship, fellowship, and caring for one another. Communities renew by acting out God's love in the world. This month's Bible verse is Romans 12:2 "Don't be conformed to the patterns of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds so that you can figure out what God's will is—what is good and pleasing and mature." During Lent and Holy Week, we will continue exploring ways to be renewed and inspired to act out God's love in this world.

Together, we will explore biblical passages, literary treasures, and meaningful rituals, unveiling different facets of renewal: from drawing strength from divine wisdom to living authentically, from experiencing the heart's transformation through divine promises to grappling with life's profound questions and seeking purpose. The essence of humility, service, and compassion in confronting injustices is explored, all while nurturing the seeds of hope and joy found in the promise of resurrection and new beginnings. Our shared exploration aims to ignite spiritual growth within, weaving together diverse sources of wisdom and insight to navigate life's twists and turns and embrace the transformative forces of faith, love, and grace.

March 3 - Divine Wisdom, Human Strength: The Paradox of Renewal (1 Corinthians 1:18-25) In the paradox of renewal, 1 Corinthians 1:25 teaches, "For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength." Join us as we draw strength from divine wisdom, finding inspiration in Tiya Miles' "Wild Girls." It is a story of how the outdoors shaped God's troublemakers.

**March 10** - Walking in the Light: Renewal through Truth and Deeds (John 3:14-21) John 3:21 encourages us to do what is true and come to the light. As we explore the theme of renewal through truth and deeds, we'll draw inspiration from the animated film "Encanto."

**March 17** - Written on Hearts: God's Covenant of Renewal (Jeremiah 31:31-34) God's covenant is not written on tablets but on our hearts (Jeremiah 31:33). Join us as we reflect on the covenant of renewal and find inspiration in the timeless story of "Les Misérables."

March 24 - Sunday Renewal: The Unridden Colt (Mark 11:1-11)

Together, we will explore the significance of Mark 11:2-3, where Jesus instructs his disciples to find an unridden colt, setting the stage for Palm Sunday. This passage is a starting point for exploring parallels with Holden Caulfield's journey in "The Catcher in the Rye," highlighting themes of authenticity, the search for meaning amidst disillusionment, and the complexities of navigating faith and societal expectations.

#### March 28 - Maundy Thursday: Recipes for Renewal

We will reflect on John 13:16, where Jesus teaches about humility and service. As we commemorate the Last Supper, we will engage in a symbolic hand-washing ceremony, reminding us of the transformation and grace that God so freely gives. May this day inspire us to embody Christ's love and humility in our interactions with others.

#### March 29 - Good Friday: Holding the Bible and the Newspaper

On this solemn day of remembrance, we contemplate the 7 Last Words of Christ. As we hold the Bible in one hand and the newspaper in the other, we confront the reality of suffering and oppression. Inspired by Karl Barth's call to action, we commit ourselves to seeking justice and compassion for God's children, recognizing the profound sacrifice made on Good Friday.

#### March 31 - Easter Sunday: Renewed Joy

Easter Sunday dawns with the promise of renewed hope and joy. In John 20:1-18, we witness Mary's transformation from sorrow to overwhelming joy as she encounters the risen Christ at the empty tomb. Like Mary, we stand on the threshold of new beginnings, embracing the hope and promise of resurrection. Drawing inspiration from A.A. Milne's "Winnie the Pooh," we celebrate Easter with childlike wonder, rejoicing in the gift of new life and the triumph of light over darkness.

The focus of that brief SLT update will be on our Missions work and will highlight the many ways we serve our greater community. Recently, the SLT discussed the need for an updated church directory, and a small team has been established to focus on gathering information for that project. Another small group is focusing energy on understanding and addressing the sound system we use in the sanctuary – how we can maximize what we currently have and what needs to be updated.

Did you know you can find the names and ministries of each shepherd in the newsletter every month? Please be encouraged to bring your questions, suggestions, and concerns to this group so that your voice is heard. This is your church, your congregation, your community of faith. Together we learn and grow. It is here that our tender shoots spring forth and bloom to reflect the beauty our Creator intended. May your Lenten journey be a time of reflection and renewal.

#### What's happening in Building and Grounds?

During the month of February, the building and grounds crew has spent a lot of time planning and updating their capital expenditures and budgets. We are moving forward with new contracts for purchasing a new copier and print services and as well as a new

landscaping contract. We have had several painters come to evaluate painting 3 gables on the west side of the building and will get them painted once it gets a bit warmer outside. We are also in the process of pursuing quotes for new carpeting in the Narthex and Sanctuary as well as electronic exterior door locks for increased accessibility, safety, and accountability.

Besides all of these big-ticket items B&G has been tightening up all the loose hardware on everything from toilets to office cabinets. Setting up tables and chairs for events is always happening (and how we stay in good shape). We've been replacing light bulbs, cleaning drains, touching up paint where needed, and updating our maintenance checks and services.

# COLLECTING FOR RECYCLING: Foam / Polystyrene packaging products

Inviting all church members and friends to drop off <u>clean</u> polystyrene (Styrofoam) packaging materials at YCUCC. Place in large box in vestibule.

April 7 - April 21

What products can be turned in for recycling?

Foam products with recycling symbol - number 6

Examples: foam food service containers, including foam cups, plates, take-out containers, egg cartons, as well as shaped or molded foam often used to package electronics or other products.

#### Foam can be recycled by:

- Rinse cups and containers to rid them of food.
- Place foam in a clear plastic bag.
- NO straws or lids.
- NO foam insulation
- NO packaging peanuts

This environmental project is sponsored by YCUCC's Green Team, who will be responsible for taking the polystyrene products to Dart Container Corporation in North Aurora where it will be recycled into new products.


# **Spiritual Development Group (SDG)**


