

Pastor's Porch

Dear Church Family,

As we begin the new year together, I am inspired by the Apostle Paul's words in 1 Corinthians 12:12-31, which beautifully connect the body of Christ—Christ's beloved community—to the human body. Paul writes:

"Christ is just like the human body—a body is a unit and has many parts; and all the parts of the body are one body, even though there are many. We were all baptized by one Spirit into one body, whether Jew or Greek, or slave or free, and we all were given one Spirit to drink."

This passage reminds us that each community member is vital to the whole. When one part of the body hurts, it impacts the entire body. Similarly, when one part of the body rejoices, we all rejoice together. Paul's metaphor calls us to care for one another with compassion, recognizing that our spiritual health is tied to the health of the community as a whole.

In the spirit of this passage, I'm excited to share a personal opportunity for growth that I believe will enrich our shared worship life. This year, I am taking a Doctor of Ministry course titled *"Stand-Up Preaching,"* which offers a unique lens to explore the intersection of faith, storytelling, and practical theology. The course name is a playful nod to the art of stand-up comedy and the preacher's call to stand up for the least of these—bringing God's justice, peace, and love into the world.

While comedy and preaching may seem worlds apart, they share a decisive common goal: engaging people's hearts and minds to reveal deeper truths about our lives and communities. Preaching is not about entertainment—it's about connection. It takes God's living Word and proclaims it in ways that inspire and transform, helping us recognize God's presence in moments of joy, challenge, grief, and change.

Just as stand-up comedy often shines a light on parts of society that are overlooked or hurting, preaching illuminates the areas of our lives and communities that need healing, hope, and renewal. Both rely on storytelling to hold a mirror to our world, revealing the grace and justice God intends for all creation. In this course, I will focus on storytelling and the embodiment of God's Word, learning to connect more deeply with those who hear the Gospel. I'll even have the chance to analyze stand-up routines, exploring how the rhythms and cadences of comedy can inspire more engaging and effective preaching.

This learning journey is not just for me—it's for all of us. As I grow as a preacher, I hope to bring fresh energy and insights to our worship life, reminding us that God's Word is alive and relevant to every corner of our lives. As we step into this new year, I invite you to consider how God's Word might call you to engage more deeply with your own story and the story of our faith community. Together, we are the body of Christ, and each of us has a part to play in proclaiming God's love and justice to the world.

In February, we will continue our sermon series, "Currents of Faith," exploring how God's guidance, provision, and joy flow through our lives. Each week, we'll reflect on how God meets us in life's challenges, nourishes our spirits, and calls us into deeper trust and action.

February 2, 2025 – Creating Springs of Welcome

Scripture: Psalm 84; Matthew 25:44-45

Focus Verse: Psalm 84:6 – "As they go through the valley of Baca, they make it a place of springs; the early rain also covers it with pools."

We'll begin by reflecting on how God transforms our dry and weary places into springs of renewal. This week, we'll consider the divine call to create spaces of welcome and care in our lives and community.

February 9, 2025 - Cast into the Depths

Scripture: Luke 5:1-11

Focus Verse: Luke 5:4 – "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Jesus' invitation to cast out into the depths is a bold call to faith and trust. This Sunday, we'll explore what it means to step beyond our comfort zones and dive into the deep waters of discipleship.

February 16, 2025 – Roots by the River: Flourishing in Trust

Scripture: Jeremiah 17:8

Focus Verse: Jeremiah 17:8 – "They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream." In times of uncertainty and challenge, God offers us deep roots of faith that sustain and nourish us. This message will encourage us to embrace resilience and trust as we flourish in God's care.

February 23, 2025 – Delighting in God

Scripture: Psalm 37:1-11, 39-40

Focus Verse: Psalm 37:4 – "Take delight in the Lord who will give you the desires of your heart."

To close the month, we will be blessed by the leadership of guest preacher Rev. Jeffrey Phillips. Together, we'll reflect on the joy and fulfillment of delighting in God's presence and promises.

Let us begin this new year with curiosity, compassion, and a shared commitment to being the body of Christ. May God's love and justice flow through us like a mighty current, carrying us forward into the fullness of life together.





Winter Fuel Economy Tips to Make Gas Dollars Go Further

When it comes to winter fuel economy, how much can you save? **Try these 8 tips to reduce fuel consumption this winter and reward both your wallet and the environment.** by Pauline Milner

1. Slow Down.

If you drive 50 MPH as opposed to 60 MPH, your fuel usage can drop by as much as 7%.

2. Don't sit idly waiting.

Depending on the type of car you have, you may burn about 1/8 gallon of gas for every 15 minutes of idling. Depending on the gas prices in your area, you can do the math to determine how much idling for 10 to 15 minutes costs you. *Tip: Remember never to idle backed up to a snowbank, even with the window cracked open. Carbon Dioxide re-entering your vehicle from exhaust can be fatal.*

3. Keep your windows up and the sunroof closed.

When you drive with the windows rolled down or the sunroof open, you create aerodynamic drag that will drive your fuel costs up by 10%.

4. Watch tire pressure.

You can use up to 4% more fuel if your tire pressures are uneven. Tire gauges are easy to use, and the recommended tire pressure can be found on the sticker inside the driver's door.

5. Plan your stops for errands

Take a moment to plan stops when doing errands. Choose the route that makes the shortest loop back home.

6. Avoid premium fuels.

Ample studies have demonstrated that premium fuels perform just as well as economic options, with the only real payoff being, possibly, less environmental impact. Even car manufacturers admit that the stated requirement for premium fuel use is merely a suggestion. Premium fuels can cost as much as 40 cents more per gallon.

7. Keep vehicle maintained.

Do not neglect to keep your vehicle well-tuned. Purchasing a winter preparation package from your local garage can result in 30% better fuel efficiency, depending on the age and type of your car. Air filters, worn brakes, residue in the fuel lines, and deteriorated oil will reduce fuel performance. Related: <u>4 Ways to Extend the Life of Your Car</u>

8. Stay in line.

Misalignment of your vehicle can increase drivetrain drag, translating into a cost of up to 21 cents a gallon or more in fuel usage.

Electric Vehicles - Cold Weather Energy Saving Tips

* Plug into electric 5 minutes before driving. Turn on vehicle and touch "heat" with temp to 80 and high fan. Let it run for 5 minutes. Cabin will be warm AND battery will be warmed. Turn off the heat and fan; use only the heated seat and steering wheel. You will be comfortably warm, and the battery will perform well giving you the best miles per kW of energy.

Confirmation Class Styrofoam Project Submitted by the Confirmation Class

The Confirmation Class, with the help of the Green Team, is hosting a Styrofoam collection project to help the environment, Styrofoam is one of the most widespread waste products, filling up 30% of landfills globally and it takes approximately 500 years to decompose! It releases harmful chemicals into the environment and it is unhealthy for animals and other wildlife.

Styrofoam contains chemicals that can spread into food packaging. Styrofoam is also lightweight and can easily break into small pieces, chocking animals and birds.

After we collect the Styrofoam we will take it to a local plastic fabrication company where it is recycled into new products. When the collection starts, we will have two large labeled cardboard boxes at the entrance where can drop off Styrofoam to help with the projects.

After the project, we will publish an article with photos in *The Happenings* church newsletter, which will have the amount of Styrofoam collected, and thank the congregation for their support.



Adult Education Black History Month

This month, I encourage you to pick up a copy of *Black Liturgies: Prayers, Poems, and Mediations for Staying Human* by Cole Arthur Riley. It is part of the United Church of Christ's 2024 All Church Read. "Black Liturgies is a prayer book, including a section of prayers and reflections based on themes and another section of prayers and ritual practices based on seasons, celebrations, or times." I also recommend the 1619 Project: A New Origin Story by Nikole Hannah-Jones. It is available in book format and as a Limited Series on Hulu. The series is six one-hour episodes. The book has been banned in several states. In 2020, then President Trump stated "This project rewrites American history to teach our children that we were founded on the principle of oppression, not freedom" and then proposed creating a new 1776 commission to "reinstate "patriotism" in American schools." (CBS News) Now it is more important than ever to keep reading and learning. Read the book, watch the series, and decide for yourself. I would also love to have an intensive book study on the 1619 project. If anyone is interested, email me–<u>ajlsan1@hotmail.com</u> and we can plan something.

Finally, I have found great comfort in these troubling times by listening to and reading African-American preachers, authors, and activists. They speak biblically about what is happening in the world, but help us remember to turn to God, not despair. I recommend: Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II, author, and co-chair of the Poor People's Campaign; Rev. Dr. Otis Moss III, pastor of Trinity United Church of Christ; and Rev. Dr. Raphael Warnock, Senator from Georgian and Senior Pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, Georgia.


Book Study
